



Canadian Ultimate Players Association Coach and Chaperone Conduct Policy 2006

1.0 Coach and Chaperone Conduct Policy 2006

- 1.1 All junior teams traveling to any CUPA functions must be supervised by an adult over the age of 21. The ratio for supervision is 12 players per chaperone. Thus, a team of more than 12 players must have two chaperones. In addition, coed teams must ensure that there are chaperones of each gender, regardless of the number of players on the team.
- 1.2 Coaches and Chaperones for Junior National teams attending Worlds must be 25 years or older.
- 1.3 Coaches and Chaperones must have a letter of acceptance from the director of the governing body of the team's region. (For example, team chaperones from Manitoba must have a letter of acceptance from the president of Manitoba Organization of Disc Sports; in BC, team chaperones must have a letter of acceptance from the Junior Coordinator of the British Columbia Disc Sports Society.) If a region does not have an official governing body, then a letter from the region's representative on the CUPA Board of Directors, the Canadian Junior Ultimate Coordinator, or the Executive Director of CUPA will be accepted. This letter is to be sent to the event organizers along with team registration fees.
- 1.4 For Canadian Junior Ultimate Championships, a copy of each acceptance letter is to be sent to the Canadian Junior Ultimate Coordinator with the team's signed Junior Conduct forms.
- 1.5 Coaches and Chaperones must stay in the same accommodations as the players, unless the players are being billeted with local families. If players are being billeted, the chaperone's accommodations and phone number must be known by each family and the organizers of the event.
- 1.6 Coaches and Chaperones must not consume alcohol or illegal drugs, or be under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs, when in the presence of the players for which they are responsible.
- 1.7 Coaches and Chaperones are expected to behave in an adult, responsible manner and set a good example for the players. Therefore, if they are willing to take this responsibility, then they must behave accordingly and appropriately.

2.0 Repercussions

- 2.1 Coaches and Chaperones who do not adhere to the expectations in this form will face consequences.
- 2.2 Coaches will be suspended from coaching for a duration deemed appropriate by the CUPA Executive Director and the Canadian Junior Ultimate Coordinator. Suspended coaches will be asked to leave and remain off event sites.
- 2.3 A suspended coach must write a formal application to the CUPA Executive Director and The Canadian Junior Ultimate Coordinator for reinstatement in order to be involved in future CUPA sanctioned events or teams.
